The Year in Review

September

- LRES PTO hosted "Night Under the Stars" a fun family night.
- RHS Homecoming Pep Rally, parade, and games!
- RHS Band participated in the Town of Raymond's September 11th Remembrance Ceremony on the Town Common.
- RHS Bring Your Own Device began with 23 teachers participating.
- LRES students harvested their community garden.

October

- The Family Engagement Action Team (FEAT) sponsored a Literacy Book Bash. This was a fun and educational Friday evening, featuring guest authors and readers, roving literacy characters, a poetry corner, and a book swap. This event was open to all Raymond students. About 260 children attended!
- Schools celebrated Red Ribbon Week, which is the oldest and largest drug prevention campaign in the country. Through this campaign, communities and individuals commit to drug prevention and education for children and a personal commitment to live drug-free lives.
- Staff raised \$350 through a jeans day fundraiser toward breast cancer awareness.
- 6th grade students spent a spectacular week of science-related activities at Nature's Classroom on the coast of Maine.
- IHGMS School Nurse Monique Gauthier pursued a plan to provide Raymond schools with a total of six epi-pens for emergency use.
- Schools kicked off their anti-bullying programs. LRES students walked to the Town Common to talk together about bullying prevention. Mr. Rich from Youth Beatz, along with Raymond Police, were part of a community event at IH-GMS to talk with parents about the legal issues surrounding bullying. And RHS students participated in a "Mix It Up Lunch," which provided students with the opportunity to meet, talk, and eat lunch with different groups of students.

November

- The District website was revamped and our new District logo was revealed. The new logo, designed by IHGMS' Sandra Bowles, incorporates a ram for RHS and IHGMS and a frog for LRES.
- IHGMS was awarded grant funding to become part of USDA's Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program. This program allowed the school to provide an extra serving of fresh fruits or vegetables to all students at a non-meal time during the school day.
- LRES and RHS students collected non-perishables for the food bank. IHGMS students raised money with the Exeter Chamber to purchase new coats and mittens for Raymond area children.
- Boys and girls soccer teams made it to the playoffs this season and girls soccer made it to the final four.
- The RHS Math Team took 2nd Place at the Southeastern Conference Math League.
- IHGMS teachers Coleen Bridle and Rebecca Sharrow presented at the Christa McAuliffe Technology Conference about the use of technology in our classrooms.
- A "Wall of Thanks" was created at IHGMS to commemorate Veterans Day. Staff and students shared photos of friends and relatives who served in the military.
- LRES and Raymond Rotary collected gently used winter coats for their Annual Coat Drive/Swap. Coats were distributed to families in mid-November.

December

- The LRES PTO sponsored the Artist in Residence, welcoming Mr. Rich from Youth Beatz back to the school to work with students and prepare for an evening presentation to parents.
- The RHS Band participate in Wreaths Across America. Wal-Mart filled a caravan of 18-wheelers with holiday wreaths to be laid at the foot of veterans' headstones at Arlington Cemetery and other sites along the way.
- LRES classrooms took part in "The Joy of Giving" project. Approximately 370 non-perishables were collected and donated to the Raymond Food Pantry.
- The IHGMS 7th and 8th Grade Chorus visited LRES to present holiday music during an assembly for students. IHGMS Band and Chorus had their first concert of the year and also gave a presentation to a local nursing home. The Raymond Singers and the RHS concert Band presented the Annual Raymond High School Winter Concert.
- IHGMS teacher Jim White was honored at an awards dinner for semi-finalist Teacher of the Year.
- RHS students attended STAND UP 2012, joining other students and teachers from across Massachusetts, New Hampshire, and Rhode Island for a one-day program to take a stand against all forms of bullying.

January

- Youth Action Groups put together a video titled "What does prevention look like to you?" The video was entered into a Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services contest.
- RCFY held Project Safeguard for 7th grade students, sponsored by Wal-Mart and I.C. Reed. Project Safeguard is an information day about drug use, dangers of alcohol, healthy relationships, internet safety, and healthy decision-making.
- Three RHS students were selected to perform in the 2013 Uncacoonuc Mountain Music Festival.
- LRES students published their first "21st Century Times" student newspaper.
- The RHS Children's Literature class visited LRES to share their stories with students and teachers.
- Raymond Police joined school administrators to complete a safety assessment of each school building.
- IHGMS teachers Pat Popieniek, Rebecca Sharrow, and Coleen Bridle were asked to present at the New England League of Middle Schools Annual Conference regarding the "Bring Your Own Device" program.

February

- The Family Engagement Action team (FEAT) held the third annual Math and Literacy Night, open to all students.
- IHGMS held an anti-bullying assembly featuring Youth Beatz and students took part in a "Mix It Up Lunch."
- IHGMS Student Council ran their Pennies for Patients drive to benefit the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society and raised \$808.23!
- Staff from all around the District took the "Penguin Plunge" and dove into the icy waters at Hampton Beach to raise money toward a Raymond Special Olympics team. Raymond School District won the Snares Flock Award as the flock who made an exceptional contribution to the Plunge through their spirit, loyalty, and fundraising. The team of 18 raised \$10,000!
- RHS boys basketball reached the playoffs and our RHS gymnast competed in the New England Gymnastics Competition.

March

- RHS students and staff took part in Challenge Night. This event was comprised of a series of activities to build trust and empathy in an environment where everyone can feel valued, safe, and supportive. The program is design to empower students to take more responsibility for their school and their learning.
- 12th Annual Monster Concerts! The Monster Choral Concert and the Monster Instrumental Concert featured all of the District's performing groups, representing musicians in grades 3-12.
- 5th grade celebrated Dr. Seuss Day, inviting parents and family in to read to students.
- IHGMS student winners were named for the Voter Information Project Essay Contest. This year's challenge was to write a persuasive essay for or against voter identification laws.
- 4th grade students visited the State House and the History Museum in Concord. Some were even able to meet Governor Maggie Hassan. At the State House, students also met with Raymond's State Representatives, Mr. Kappler and Mrs. Hoelzel.
- IHGMS Youth Action students participated in a Flash Mob as part of the anti-smoking campaign National Kick Butts Day.
- The RHS LifeSmarts Team came in second place as the State Finalists for the 2013 LifeSmarts competition. LifeSmarts is
 a consumer knowledge competition designed for high school students, concentrating on personal finance, health and
 safety, environmental technology, and consumer rights and responsibilities.
- LRES students treated to an assembly sponsored by their PTO, "The Circle of Life" a motivation/character-building program.
- RHS Guidance Counselor Sue Puchacz was chosen the New Hampshire High School Guidance Counselor of the Year!

April

- RHS Spirit Week! Academic Challenges, Hallway Decorating Contest, lunch and after-school competitions, a kick-off dance, and a week-long Penny Drive.
- JAG students did some community service at the Manchester Food bank as part of their Career Association's commitment to promotion civic awareness. They helped pack bags for the food bank's Backpack Program.
- 7th and 8th grade students were able to attend a Career Fair featuring 18 area businesses, 22 representatives, and 1 dog. Students were able to attend a 20-minute class presentation on each of two careers of their choice.

- Internet Safety training for teachers held, led by Raymond Police Department.
- FEAT held their Science and Technology Night.
- Instrumental and Chorus Monster Concerts Concerts showcasing the talents of our musical students.

May

- IHGMS Band Director Cathy St. Onge was named the 2013 NH Young Band Director!
- Raymond students participated in the running of the Special Olympics Torch. The Olympians carried the torch from the Candia Police Station to the Raymond town line. Six middle and high school athletes competed in the Track and Field at the NH Summer Games at UNH at the end of May.
- RHS seniors traveled to New York and New Jersey for their Senior Class Trip.
- The LRES Building Committee held a public forum to discuss options for the building with the community.
- Raymond's 21st Century After School Program was featured on NH Chronicle.
- RHS Drama Club held their year-end production of *Yearbook*, a play about how the yearbook staff overcame their fears during the past year. The play gave an insider's look at the students' lives as they ended the school year.
- RHS photography students spent a day at Odiorne State Park for some scenic picture-taking.
- RHS International Club students held their annual international dinner night to honor the work the members do each year to earn money for worthy causes.

June

- RHS science students visited Canobie Lake Park for Physics Day, where they explored hands-on physical principles using real-world examples throughout the park.
- 7th grade students enjoyed a whale watch.
- Five RHS seniors were named New Hampshire Scholars and were honored in Concord.
- The first meeting toward establishing a Raymond Education Foundation was held.
- 81 Seniors graduated!

2012-2013 Assessment Testing

Fall 2012 Reading and Math NECAP Testing

The NECAP tests are state-mandated assessment tests given twice a year. The fall assessments tested students in grades 3-8 and grade 11. Results are received by the District later in the year and reviewed by our Data Team. We use this data to formulate our next steps in helping each individual student in reaching their growth targets.

- This year's Math and Reading NECAP testing resulted in the highest percentage of students scoring proficient since the NECAP testing started.
- 11th grade matched the state average in reading.
- 5th grade to 6th grade showed a 13 point gain in reading.
- 4th grade to 5th grade showed a 12 point decrease in reading.
- 7th, 8th, and 11th grade math is ahead of the state average.
- 4th to 5th grade showed and 11 point decrease in math.
- 5th grade to 6th grade showed an 8 point gain in math.

In order to increase our students' success on NECAP testing, we continue to take several steps, including improving proctoring of tests, creating small groups for special needs students for the NECAP tests, developing action plans for each grade level to address assessment testing concerns, and team teaching between special education teachers and regular education teachers. Goal sheets will go home with all K-8 students for the 2013-14 school year. The high school will use Naviance for their goal setting with students.

NWEA Testing

NWEA (Northwest Evaluation Association) benchmark testing is done in the middle of the year and at the end of the year in grades K-8. Results are immediate and are helpful in identifying challenge areas for students, as well as strengths.

- Grade 2 and grade 7 have three consecutive years of growth in reaching student target growths in reading.
- Grade 2 and Grade 8 have three years of growth in reaching student target growths in math.
- All grade levels but one exceeded the norms in 2013 in both math and reading.
- 2013 results showed the best scores yet for 4th, 7th, and 8th grade in math.


USA Test Prep

USA Test Prep is a benchmark assessment program used at the high school level not only in preparation for NECAP and SAT tests but also, similar to NWEA testing, to identify challenges and strengths at an individual level.

- All post tests in math and reading show improvement.
- 9th grade math improved from 35% of students in top half to 51%.
- 10th grade math improved from only 18% at the top level to 27%.
- Physical science scores improved from 5% at the top level to 21%.
- 11th grade chemistry went from 13% at the top level to 31%.

DISTRIBUTION OF EXPENSES


