Superintendent's Message

The 2015-2016 school year has been a year of many positives for the Raymond School District. Our Building Committee worked extremely hard to demonstrate the need to eliminate portable classrooms at the elementary school and we had an incredible turn-out for the March vote. Although the plan didn't pass, it was so amazing to see all the support our teachers and schools have from the people of Raymond. The passed budget also provides for full day kindergarten and we are able to add two Spanish I classes at the middle school- wonderful gains for our students!

One of our priorities this year was to evaluate and reorganize reading instruction beginning at the elementary school. Our teachers worked with a coach, had extensive training and have created an enhanced reading program for our students.

All teachers at every level are writing competencies – these establish what our students "know and are able to do". This model will better prepare our students for their future- for jobs that have not yet been created. The teachers will take this a step further by creating performance assessments to go along with the competencies. Our high school teachers were recognized nationally and the state level for their work in this area. Of course our goal continues to be success for all students.

Other things you don't see in an annual report card include all those things that go on in the background: the amazing work our custodial staff and Facilities Director, Todd Ledoux, do to maintain the town's most valuable resources; the security measures that are in place to ensure the safety of our students and staff; the work of the School Board to access the needs of the schools alongside the resources of the community; and the work of our staff who care for our students in so many ways and help our students thrive. Without all of these things and so much more, our schools would not be the wonderful, caring, and compassionate places they are.

The Year in Review

August

- LRES PTO held an ice cream social before the start of the school year for students, families, and staff.
- Incoming RHS freshmen attended the JumpStart program for three days in August: scavenger hunts, academic strategies, cookouts, and visits to Great Bay Community College and Pease Air Force Base.

September

- RHS JumpStart students presented to the School Board, discussing how they found the program helpful as they learned to navigate high school.
- Flu shot clinics set up for employees at each school.
- IHGMS new school day Title I tutoring program up and running to support the identified students in grades 5-8.
- Homecoming weekend: hypnotist show, football game, parade, and dance/barbecue/inferno!
- IHGMS Art students won first prize at Deerfield Fair.

October

- LRES PTO hosted Night Under the Stars, followed by a student presentation to the School Board about the event.
- First Aid/CPR certification course offered to all employees.
- Retirement planning workshop offered to all employees.
- IHGMS students attended a School Board meeting to discuss their field trip to Coppal House Farm.

November

- RHS Student Council traveled to Waterville Valley for the NHASC Leadership Convention. There, they had the opportunity
 to meet with hundreds of students leaders from around the state, listen to national level leadership consultants, and contribute to statewide community service programs.
- Youth Action Group students presented to the School Board their campaign "Not everyone is doing it." The campaign was an effort to let kids and the community know that there are many students who *do not* use drugs or alcohol.
- RHS participated in *I Am College Bound/I Applied* week. Pre-planning during September and October resulted in 46 seniors (more than half of the class) submitting college applications to 65 colleges.
- LRES and Raymond Rotary partnered to conduct their 5th Annual Coat Distribution.
- RHS and IHGMS Girls Soccer teams were recognized by the School Board. The girls high school soccer team were runners-up in the Division III State Championship, and the girls middle school soccer team won the Tri County League Championship!
- IHGMS Junior National Honor Society held a canned food drive for the food bank.
- The School Board approved a plan to upgrade the outside lighting at all schools to LED lighting. This plan is in conjunction with Eversource.
- 21st Century After School Program (LEAP) students spoke with the Board about the enrichment classes and homework help provided as part of the program.
- RHS Interact Club and Peer Outreach helped Raymond Rotary pack up Thanksgiving baskets for families in need.
- The RHS Granite State Challenge Team participated in the Sunday Super Challenge at Manchester Community College.
- 5th grade participated in Manchester Monarch's Day for Education.

December

- The RHS Marching Band and the IHGMS Junior Honor Society participated in the *Wreaths Across America* ceremony on the Raymond Town Common.
- RHS Marching Rams performed in the Annual Exeter Holiday Parade.
- IHGMS science students presented their Lamprey River Exploration to the School Board. Since 2005, over 1,200 7th grade students have explored the river!
- Holiday concerts held at RHS and IHGMS.
- The RHS National Honor Society held their induction ceremony.
- Google Docs workshops held for district staff; town staff were also invited to attend.
- Music students performed at the Annual Rotary Breakfast at RHS.

- RHS hosted the *Bring 'Em Back* event. For this annual event, alumni return to the school to discuss their post-high school experiences with current juniors and seniors: from college admissions to the benefits of the military to the costs and responsibilities of adult independence.

- RHS Faculty-Student Talent Show was held, including two faculty bands, solo acts, and student performances. The event raised over \$400, which the Interact Club donated to a clean-water project in rural India.
- The RHS Unified Basketball Team held their home-opener.
- LRES held a "Kindness Challenge." Students heard kindness quotes each morning, took home paperwork for acts of kindness done at home, and wrote about what kindness means to them.

- RHS Graduation on June 10th 91 students completed their high school education this year!




College Fair at RHS


DISTRIBUTION OF EXPENSES

Beginning with the 2015-16 school year, New Hampshire replaced 11th grade Smarter Balanced Assessment Testing with the SAT. There have been content and design changes to the SAT which affect the way performance is assessed and how results are reported. The former Critical Reading portion of the SAT is now the Evidence-Based Reading and Writing section. This includes the essay portion, which is now optional. The essay is graded with a different scale than the rest of the SAT. (97% of students who took the SAT at Raymond High School in March took the optional essay portion.)
