As this very atypical school year draws to a close I would like to thank our entire educational community for pulling together to meet every challenge that arose from the COVID-19 pandemic. Students, families, teachers, employees and citizens all adjusted very quickly to changing circumstances and showed just how creative and nimble they could be. It was truly an inspiration to see how folks worked together to find new ways to educate, support and inspire our students.



While the school year is winding down, there are some obstacles still ahead of us. The District is working to plan for the start of the 2020-21 school year, in the context of changing guidelines and circumstances. Three interrelated committees will continue to meet throughout the summer to review new information and make decisions about how the District will educate all students next year. We will need to plan for several alternatives: a traditional opening with substantial modifications related to health and safety, the possible continuance of remote learning if necessary, and a feasible combination of remote and on-site learning. Updated information will be disseminated when it becomes available through newsletters, social media platforms and the District website.

Parents can help the planning process by completing a brief **survey** about Remote Instruction in Raymond. Please, while it is still fresh in your minds, provide us with feedback that will help us improve the way we serve our students. While we do not yet know exactly what the next school year will 'look like', technology will surely continue to play a large role in education going forward.

(Thinking Outside the Box) "If I could describe my ELO in 5 words it would be, interesting, COVID 19, brain-thinker, calming and knowledgeable."


