### **Guiding Principles**

- Schools play an important role in nurturing the development of children and youth; accordingly, students should be allowed to return to on-site education when possible
- Protecting the health and safety of everyone involved is our highest priority
- The District should take explicit steps to address the social and emotional needs of students and employees

### **Guiding Principles**

- Students must be taught new routines in ways that are positive, ongoing and developmentally appropriate.
- The District must be agile, and prepared to shift quickly in response to the changing conditions of the pandemic.
- Regardless of the format of education, the District must continually strive to improve the quality of instruction that is provided to all students.

## The Changing Pandemic - Threat Levels

	According to NH DHHS:	Impact to School Schedule:
GREEN	Threat of the virus is reduced and social distancing requirements are loosened; schools operate with minimal modifications	School will operate with a standard schedule on-site.
YELLOW	Threat of the virus warrants significant caution social distancing, and use of PPE; schools can provide some on-site learning with protections in place	Hybrid model with 50% capacity for some on-site education. The student body of each school will be divided into two groups:  Group A on-site M & W Group B on-site T & Th Friday - remote or other educational services (Staff work on-site Monday through Friday)
RED	Threat of the virus necessitates closure of the school; no on-site learning	All students will work remotely

### Changes to 2020-21 School Calendar

THE FIRST DAY OF SCHOOL FOR STUDENTS WILL BE

Grades 1-12: Tuesday, September 1

Grades Preschool and Kindergarten: Monday, September 14



### Full Remote Learning Choice

- Any parent or guardian who is not comfortable sending their child to school on-site during the pandemic can enroll that student in a full remote learning program.
- Grades K-8: Students will have the opportunity to engage in a fully remote learning program provided directly by the District.
- Grades 9-12: While many courses will be offered in remote format through RHS, not every class will be available in remote format. RHS students desiring a fully remote format my supplement, if needed, with courses through VLACS.

### Student and Staff Screening

- Parents/guardians will be provided with a screening checklist and requested to screen their student each morning before going to school.
- On-site employees will engage in a daily health screening which will be verified by the school nurse.
- All staff and students who are on-site will engage in a temperature screening daily upon arrival to the school building.
- Any student or employee who has been in close contact with someone suspected or confirmed to have COVID-19 must self-quarantine for 14 days (and work or learn remotely) for 14 days.
- Any student or employee who has traveled outside of the New England region is strongly advised to self-quarantine (and work or learn remotely) for 14 days.

### Response to Illness

- In the event that a person is suspected or confirmed to have COVID-19 while at school, the District will coordinate closely with NH DHHS, Division of Public Health Services.
- In the event a person doesn't meet screening requirements or displays symptoms in the building, the following steps will be taken:

### Response to Illness

- Ensure the person is wearing a mask and is then isolated under the care of the nurse
- If suspected or confirmed COVID, immediate call to public health.
- Symptomatic persons instructed to contact healthcare provider and self-isolate at home.
- Asymptomatic persons having close contact exposure to suspected of confirmed COVID-19 or who report travel related risk should self quarantine for 14 days.
- Persons suspected or confirmed to have COVID-19 must stay out of educational programming until symptom-based criteria are met.

### Social Distancing

- Student desks will be placed 3-6 feet apart, with the goal of 6 feet or more whenever possible
- 6 foot markers will be placed in areas where lines would normally form
- The direction of foot traffic will be visually indicated in hallways
- Classrooms will have assigned seating (to assist in contact tracing)
- Grades PreK-5, class cohorts will stay together
- Grade 6-12, staggered class dismissal will allow for a limited number of students passing in the hallway at one time

### Social Distancing

The flow of student arrival and dismissal will be regulated by strategies such as:

- Using multiple entrances/exits
- Dismissing students to buses from classrooms
- Requiring students to remain on buses until called upon to enter the school

### Social Distancing

#### Music Programs

There will be no indoor group or ensemble singing until tested mitigation techniques are proven effective. If providing in-person indoor instrumental ensemble experiences, teachers may focus on chamber music with smaller groups of students due to social distancing constraints.

### Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)

- Face coverings are not required for preschool students
- Face coverings are required for all students in grade K-12 at all times.
   Students in grades K-3 will receive support and direction to achieve this goal.
- Face coverings are required for employees at all times.

### Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)

- Students and employees can wear their own face coverings or use District-provided coverings.
- Any student or employee who loses, damages or otherwise ruins their face covering will be provided another to use.
- According to the CDC, there are certain circumstances in which wearing a cloth face covering may be unsafe or challenging for students.

### Personal Hygiene Routines

Staff and students will be required to practice the following practices frequently:

- Wash hands often with soap and water or use an alcohol-based sanitizer (at least 60% alcohol) if soap and water are not readily available.
- Always wash hands with soap and water if hands are visibly dirty.
- If soap and water are not readily available, younger children may use alcohol-based hand sanitizer under the direct supervision of staff.
- Cover coughs and sneezes with a tissue, then wash hands.
- Alcohol-based hand sanitizer will be available in all classrooms, office areas, waiting areas, and break rooms.

### Sanitizing Routines

Each building will receive the same level of cleaning each night, which will adhere to current CDC guidelines:

- Continue our current practice of green cleaning techniques, using HEPA filtration vacuums and microfiber cloths and mops.
- An EPA registered disinfectant will be applied nightly to all high touch areas, and frequently during the day or as needed when the building is occupied.
- Sanitizing wipes will be available in the classrooms.

### Transportation

- Face coverings are mandatory on school buses for students and drivers.
- Students are expected to wash hand thoroughly before leaving for school.
- Students will have assigned seating on the bus.
- Windows will be open on the bus weather permitting.
- Buses will be disinfected twice per day.

### School Lunch and Breakfast Program

- For students on-site, meals will be offered as usual with modifications in place.
- Students will be spaced at least 6 feet apart when eating lunch or breakfast.
- For students who are not on-site that day, or who are fully remote learning,
   bagged meals may be pre-ordered online for pickup on a predesignated day.

### Before School Program and LEAP

#### LRES Before School Program

 Only students who attend on-site that day may participate in the Before School Program.

#### LRES and IHGMS LEAP

- LEAP will operate on-site with additional remote support for students who are not at-site that day.
- The program will conclude at 5:00 PM each day.

### **Athletics**

- The District will offer sports that are categorized by the NHIAA as low risk.
- Intermediate and high risk sports may be allowed with required modifications.
