Executive Summary

The University of New Hampshire Survey Center conducted a survey for the Town of Raymond and the Raymond School District to determine what matters most to Raymond residents and which projects should be pursued to improve life in the town. Surveys were mailed to all Raymond households and P.O. Boxes (N=4,632) in April 2018 and additional copies were made available at the Town Offices and the SAU. Six hundred and sixty-three (663) surveys were completed and returned to the UNH Survey Center, yielding a response rate of 14%. The following figures display survey results including any demographic differences. Appendix A contains detailed tabular results, Appendix B contains open-ended responses, and Appendix C contains the survey instrument.

Key Findings

Lamprey River Site

Nearly half of Raymond residents believe the Lamprey River Elementary School should be kept at its current site. The remaining residents are closely divided on what they would like to do with the site; three in ten say a new school should be constructed at a different site and the building should be converted into a police station, while one in five say the Town and School District should stop investing in the site.

Lamprey River Elementary School

Two-thirds of Raymond residents say it is important for the Town to improve the elementary school facilities but residents are divided on possible plans for the Lamprey River School. Just under half say their first choice is to leave the school as it currently exists while four in ten say their first choice is to construct a new elementary school at a different site. Fewer respondents would like to renovate or refurbish the existing school facility. Residents are also divided on the timeframe in which this should be addressed; a quarter say the Town should begin renovating, refurbishing, or constructing a new school within 2 years while just over a quarter say the Town should address it in more than 10 years or never. Younger respondents and those with children in the household are more likely to favor constructing a new school and addressing the issue quickly.

Police Department

A slight majority of Raymond residents say it important for the Town to provide new space for the police department but a slight majority also say their first choice is to leave the police station as it currently exists. The remaining residents are nearly equally divided between those who want to convert the Lamprey River Elementary School into a police station and those who want to construct a new police station. Relatively few residents believe this issue needs to be addressed urgently; only one-third believe the Town should begin constructing a new police station or converting the school into one within 5 years.

Road Maintenance & Snow Removal

A majority of Raymond residents describe the roads in the town as fair or poor, but less than one-third believe the Town should increase road maintenance and repair funding to catch up on the schedule; more than half want the Town to continue funding at its current level. More than three-quarters believe the roads are treated and plowed very or somewhat well during the winter and just over half say the Town should purchase or lease snowplows and other vehicles only if it doesn't require raising taxes.

Utilities

Raymond residents are divided on the Town installing additional wells to increase the town water supply; a slight plurality say it is important for the Town to do so and nearly four in ten say the Town should address this issue within 5 years. Residents are similarly divided on the Town installing sewer facilities but only three in ten say the Town should address this issue within 5 years. Four in ten residents say they would be likely to connect to natural gas services if it were available.

Community Center

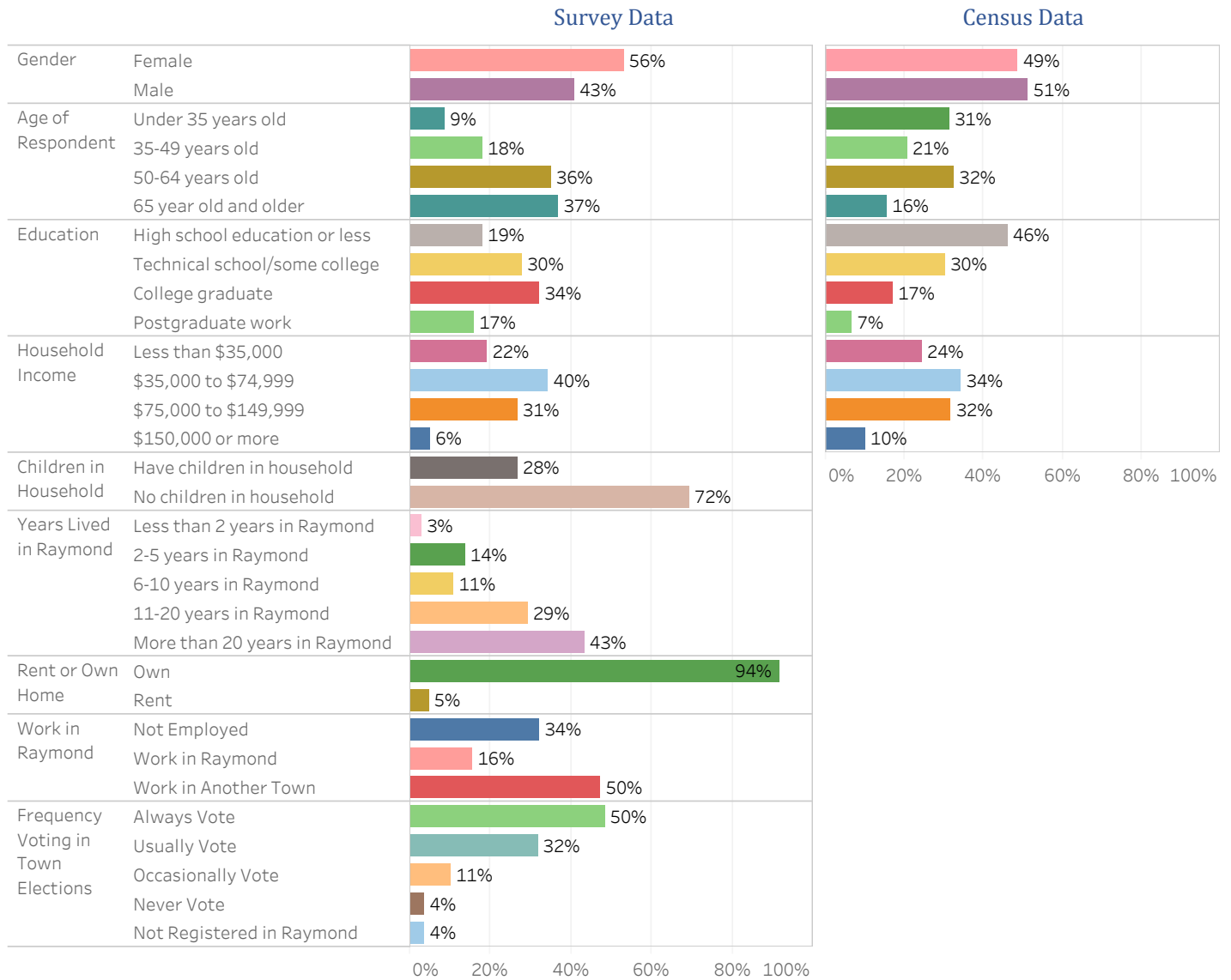
Half of Raymond residents say it is important for the Town to have a community center to host community events and daily activities but more than three-quarters say continuing to host community events in existing town spaces is their first choice among possible plans for a community center and very few expressed support for building a new community center. One in four residents believe this issue should be addressed within the next 5 years.

Town Offices

Raymond residents show little support for improving the available space for town offices; only three in eight say it is important for the Town to do so. Nearly two-thirds say their first choice among possible plans for town offices is to leave the town offices as they currently exist and just over a third say this issue should be addressed within 5 years.

Resident Demographics

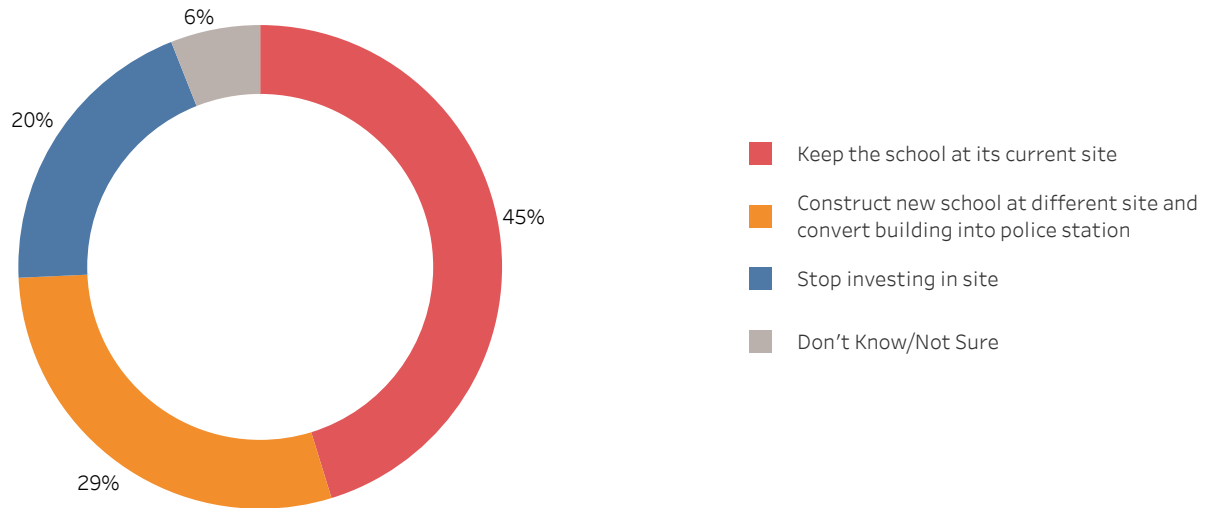
Survey respondents were older and had higher levels of education than Census estimates of Raymond as a whole, which is common for this type of survey. Women are also slightly over-represented among respondents. Respondents' income levels are broadly similar to the town at large.



Lamprey River Elementary School & Police Department

Forty-five percent of Raymond residents believe the Lamprey River Elementary School should be kept at its current site. Twenty-nine percent say a new school should be constructed at a different site and the building should be converted into a police station, 20% say the Town and School District should stop investing in the site, and 6% don't know or are unsure (Figure 1a).

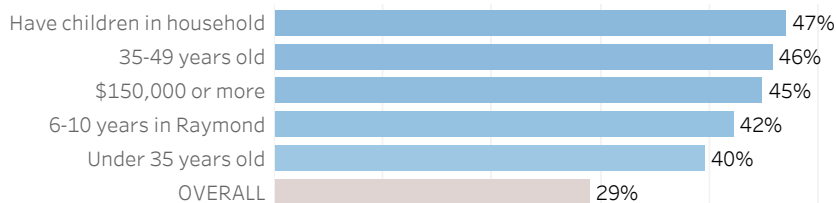
- Raymond residents who have lived in Raymond for 6-10 years and those under 35 years old are less likely than others to say the Lamprey River Elementary School should be kept at its current site.
- Raymond residents with children in their household, those under 50 years old, those with a household income of \$150,000 or more, and those who have lived in Raymond for 6-10 years are more likely than others to say a new school should be built at a different site and the school building should be converted into a police station.
- Raymond residents who have lived in Raymond for less than 5 years are more likely than others to say the Town and School District should stop investing in the site (Figure 1b).

Figure 1b: Comes Closes to Opinion on Future Use of Lamprey River School Site - By Selected Demographics

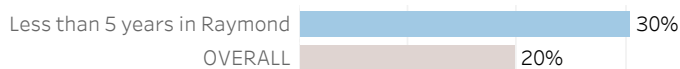

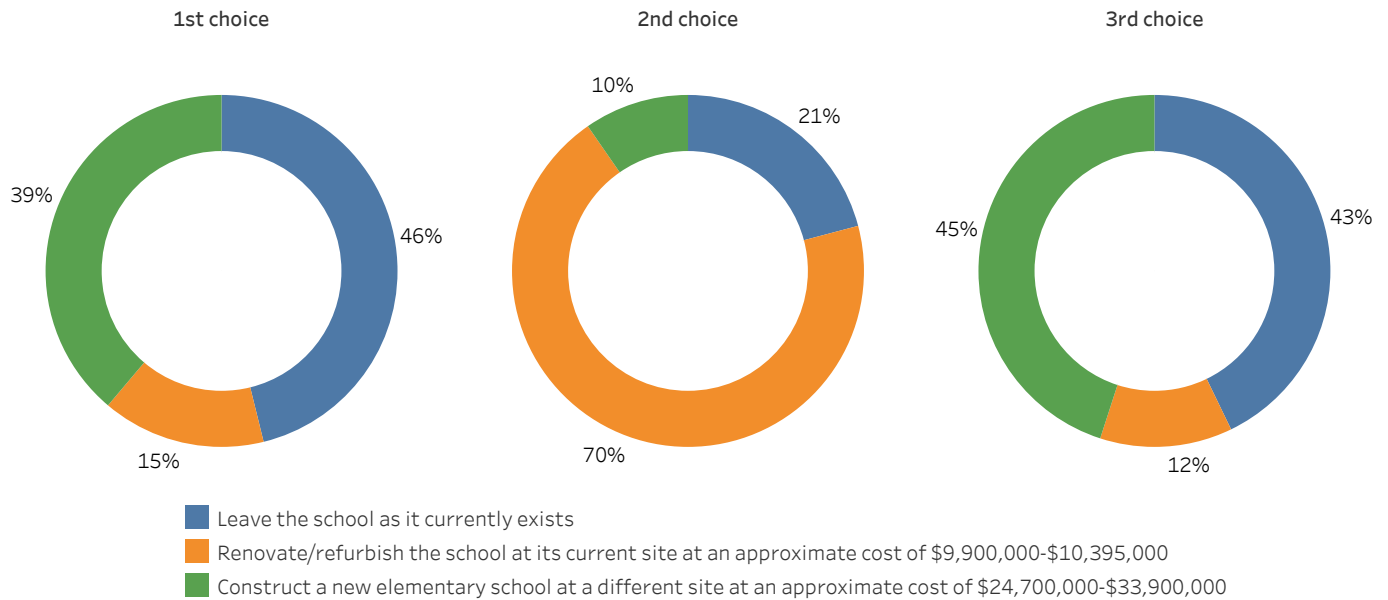

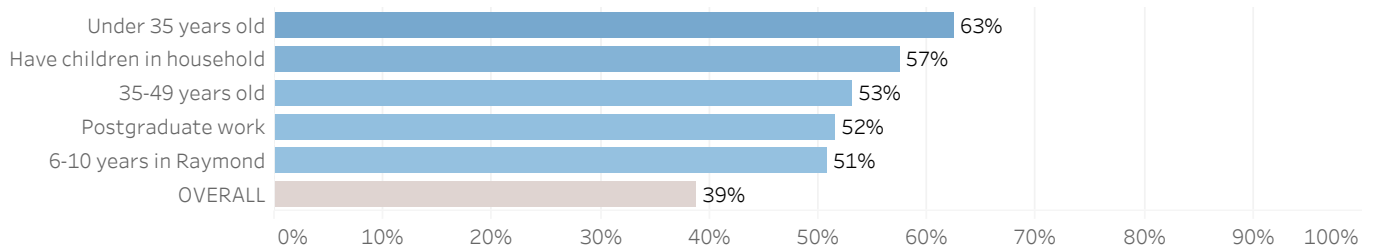
Figure 2a: Please rank the following plans for the Lamprey River Elementary School in order of your preference

Just under half of Raymond residents (46%) say leaving the school as it currently exists is their first choice among possible plans for the Lamprey River Elementary School. Fifteen percent say their first choice is to renovate/refurbish the school at its current site at an approximate cost of \$9,900,000-\$10,395,000, while 39% say their first choice is to construct a new elementary school at a different site at an approximate cost of \$24,700,000-\$33,900,000. Seven in ten Raymond residents (70%) say renovating/refurbishing the school at its current site is their second choice among these plans, while 45% say constructing a new elementary school at a different site is their third choice (Figure 2a).

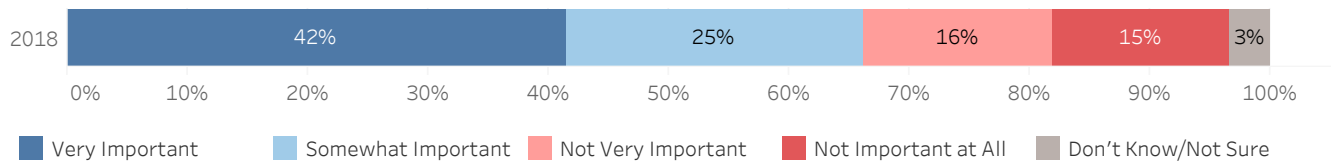
Figure 2b: First Choice Among Plans for Lamprey River Elementary School - By Selected Demographics

- Raymond residents under 50 years old, those with children in their household, those who have completed postgraduate work, and those who have lived in Raymond for 6-10 years are more likely than others to say their first choice for the Lamprey River Elementary School is to construct a new elementary school at a different site at an approximate cost of \$24,700,000-\$33,900,000 (Figure 2b).

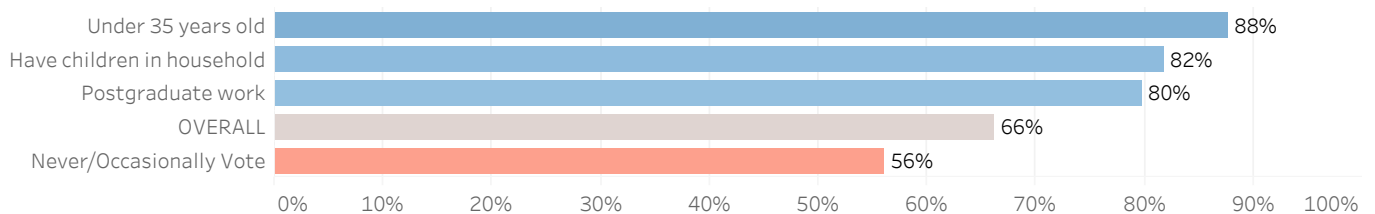
Figure 3a: Overall, how important do you believe it is for the Town to improve the elementary school facilities?

Two-thirds of Raymond residents (66%) say it is very (42%) or somewhat (25%) important for the Town to improve the elementary school facilities. Three in ten (30%) say it is not very important (16%) or not important at all (15%) for the Town to do so while 3% don't know or are unsure (Figure 3a).

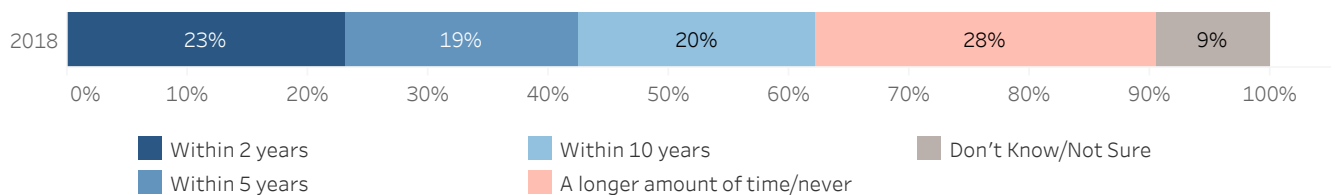
Figure 3b: Importance for Town to Improve Elementary School Facilities - By Selected Demographics

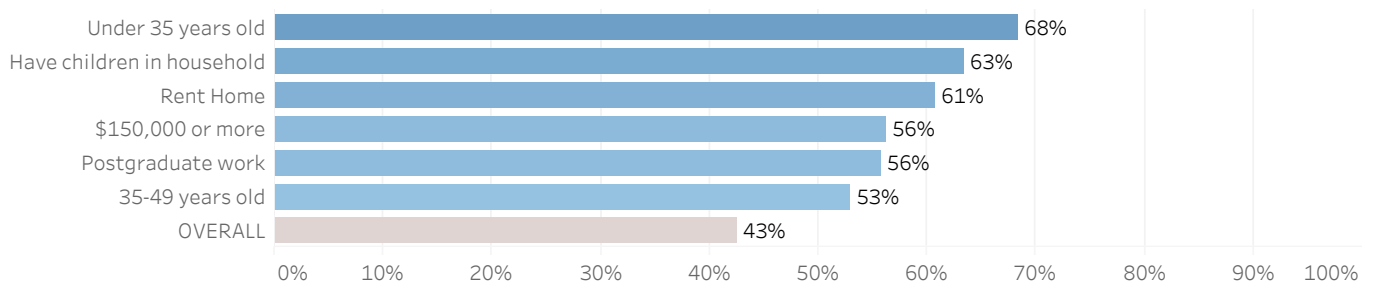
Figure 4a: Within what timeframe do you believe the Town should begin renovating/refurbishing or constructing a new school?

Twenty-three percent of Raymond residents believe the Town should begin renovating/refurbishing or constructing a new school within 2 years, 19% believe work should begin within 5 years, and 20% say it should begin within 10 years. Twenty-eight percent say work should begin in a longer amount of a time or never while 9% don't know or are unsure (Figure 4a).

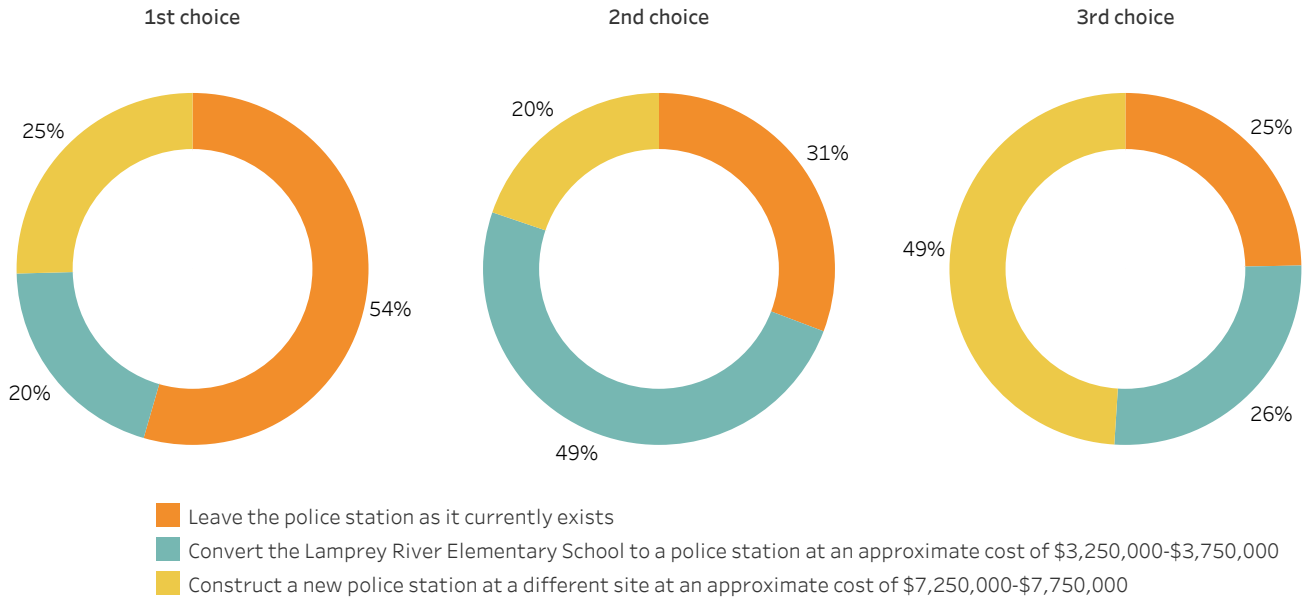
Figure 4b: Timeframe for Town to Improve Elementary School Facilities - By Selected Demographics

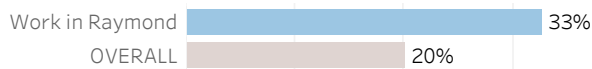
Figure 5a: Please rank the following plans for the town police department in order of your preference

Just over half of Raymond residents (54%) say leaving the police station as it currently exists is their first choice among possible plans for the town police department. One in five (20%) say their first choice is to convert the Lamprey River Elementary School to a police station at an approximate cost of \$3,250,000-\$3,750,000, while a quarter (25%) say their first choice is to construct a new police station at a different site at an approximate cost of \$7,250,000-\$7,750,000. Just under half of residents (49%) say converting the Lamprey River Elementary School to a police station is their second choice among these plans, while nearly half (49%) say constructing a new police station at a different site is their third choice (Figure 5a).

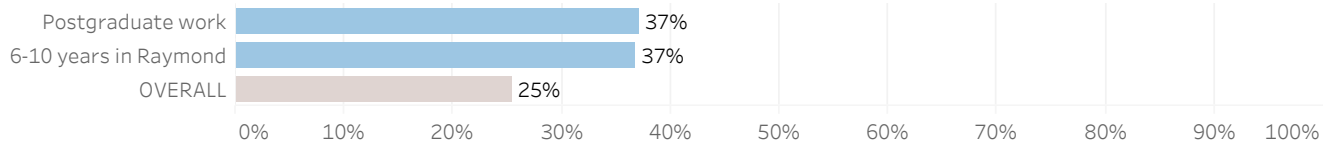
- Raymond residents who work in Raymond are more likely than others to say their first choice for the town police department is to convert the Lamprey River Elementary School to a police station at an approximate cost of \$3,250,000-\$3,700,000.
- Raymond residents who have completed postgraduate work and those who have lived in Raymond for 6-10 years are more likely than others to say their first choice for the town police department is to construct a new police station at a different site at an approximate cost of \$7,250,000-\$7,750,000 (Figure 5b).

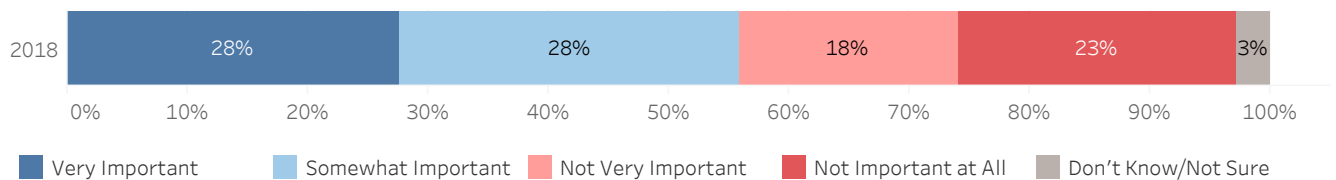

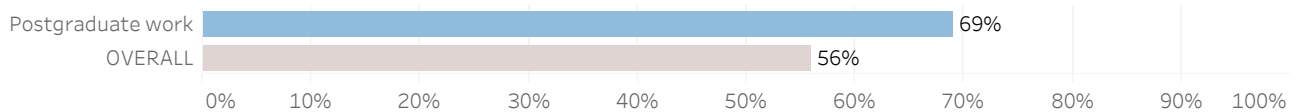
Figure 6a: Overall, how important do you believe it is for the Town to provide new space for the town police department?

Just over half of Raymond residents (56%) say it is very (28%) or somewhat (28%) important for the town to provide new space for the town police department. Eighteen percent say it is not very important and 23% say it is not important at all for the Town to do so while 3% don't know or are unsure (Figure 6a).

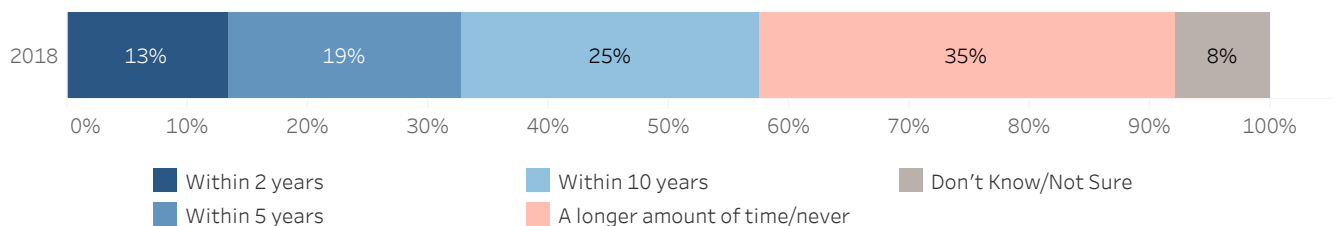
Figure 6b: Importance for Town to Provide New Space for Town Police Department - By Selected Demographics

- Raymond residents who have completed postgraduate work are more likely than others to say it is very or somewhat important for the Town to provide new space for the town police department (Figure 6b).

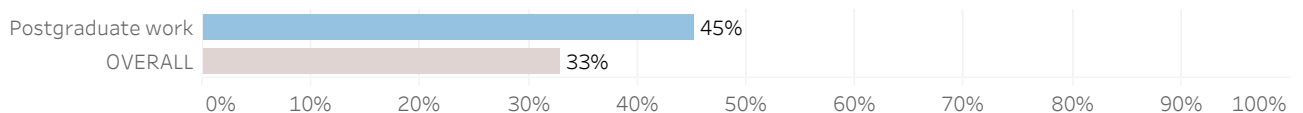
Figure 7a: Within what timeframe do you believe the Town should begin constructing a new police station or converting the school into one?

Thirteen percent of Raymond residents believe the Town should begin constructing a new police station or converting the school into one within 2 years, 19% believe work should begin within 5 years, and a quarter (25%) say it should begin within 10 years. Thirty-five percent of residents say work should begin in a longer amount of a time or never while 8% don't know or are unsure (Figure 7a).

Figure 7b: Timeframe for Town to Improve Elementary School Facilities - By Selected Demographics

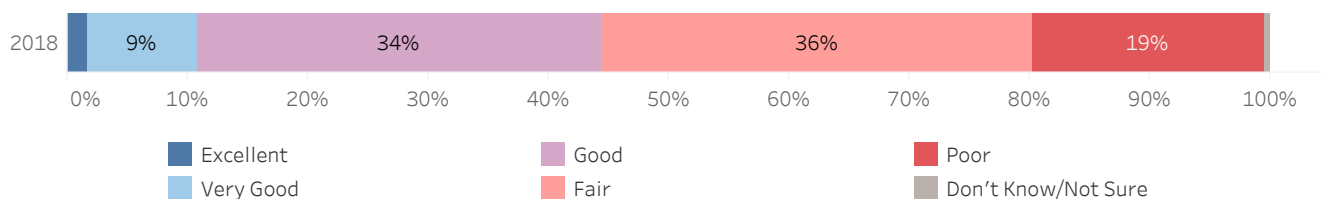

Road Maintenance & Snow Removal

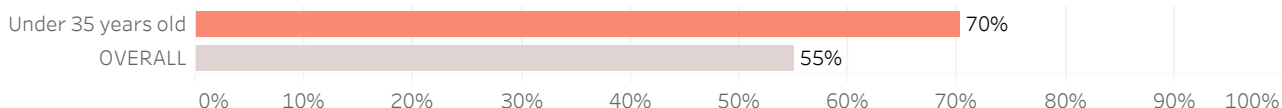
Figure 8a: How would you describe the current condition of the roads in Raymond?

Only 11% of Raymond residents describe the roads in Raymond as excellent (2%) or very good (9%) while 34% describe them as good. Thirty-six percent of Raymond residents describe the roads in Raymond as fair, 19% describe them as poor, and less than 1% don't know or are unsure (Figure 8a).

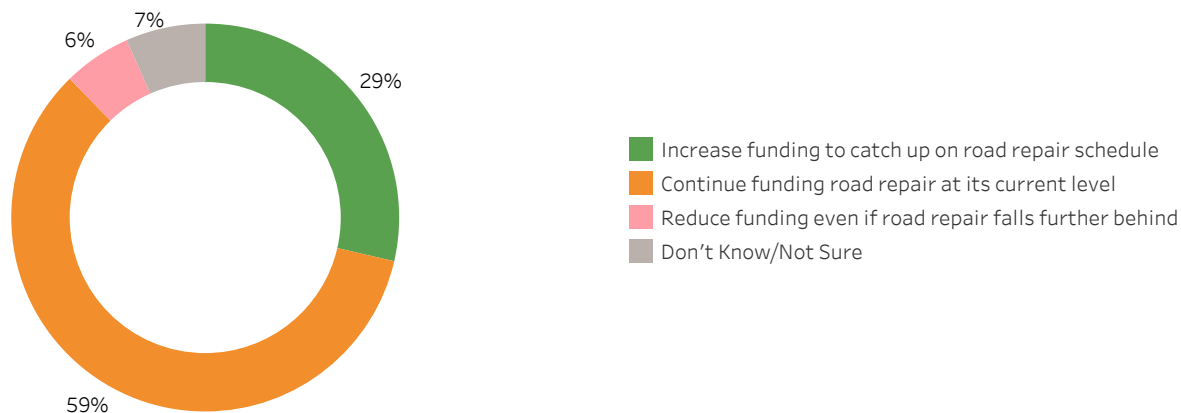
Figure 8b: Description of Current Condition of Roads in Raymond - By Selected Demographics

- Raymond residents under 35 years old are more likely than others to say the current road conditions in Raymond are fair or poor (Figure 8b).

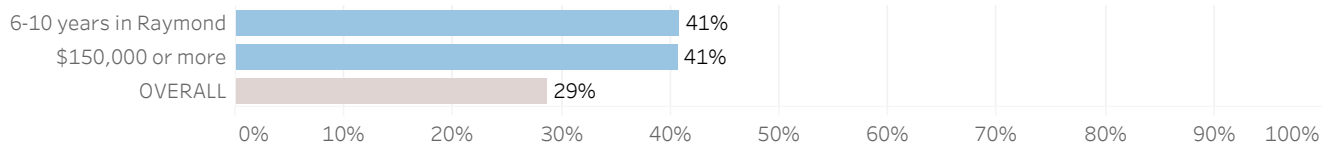
Figure 9a: In 2017, the Town doubled its funding for road maintenance and repair, but many roads in town remain behind schedule for repair. Which of the following comes closest to your opinion concerning road maintenance in the town?

Just over a quarter of Raymond residents (29%) believe the Town should increase road maintenance and repair funding to catch up on the road repair schedule while over half (59%) want the Town to continue funding at its current level. Six percent would like the Town to reduce funding even if road repair falls further behind, and 7% don't know or are unsure (Figure 9a).

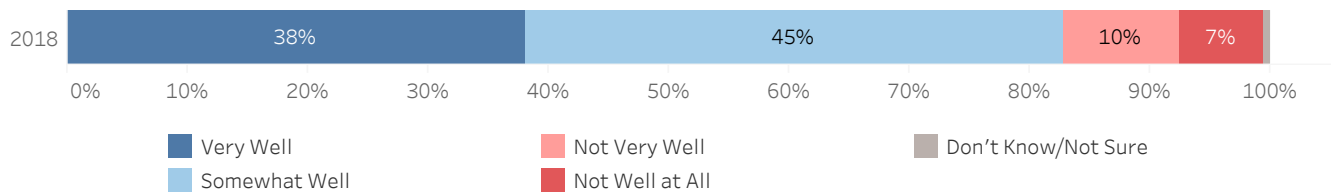
Figure 9b: Comes Closest to Opinion Concerning Road Maintenance in Town - By Selected Demographics

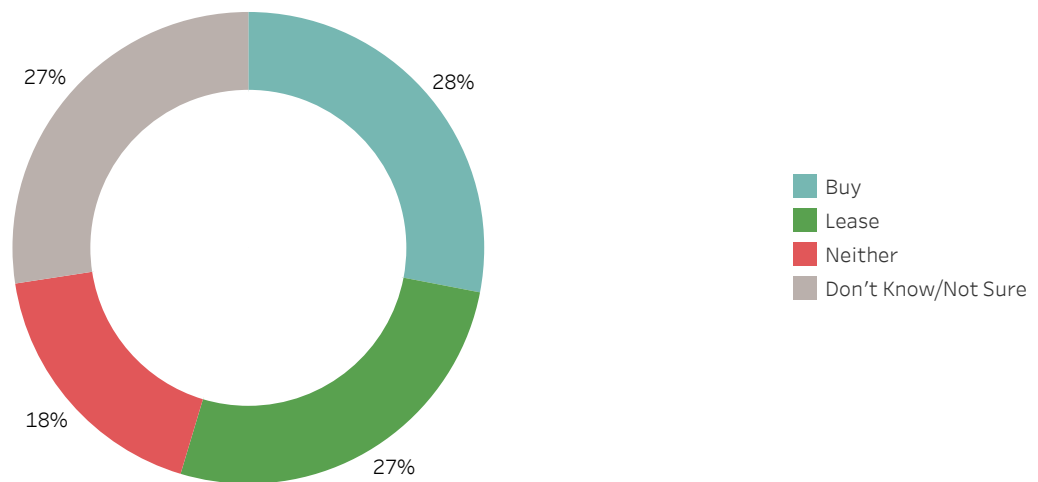
Most Raymond residents (83%) believe the roads are treated and plowed very (38%) or somewhat (45%) well during the winter in Raymond. Ten percent believe the roads are treated and plowed not very well, 7% say they are treated and plowed not well at all, and 1% don't know or are unsure (Figure 10).

Figure 10: How well do you believe roads are treated and plowed during the winter in Raymond?



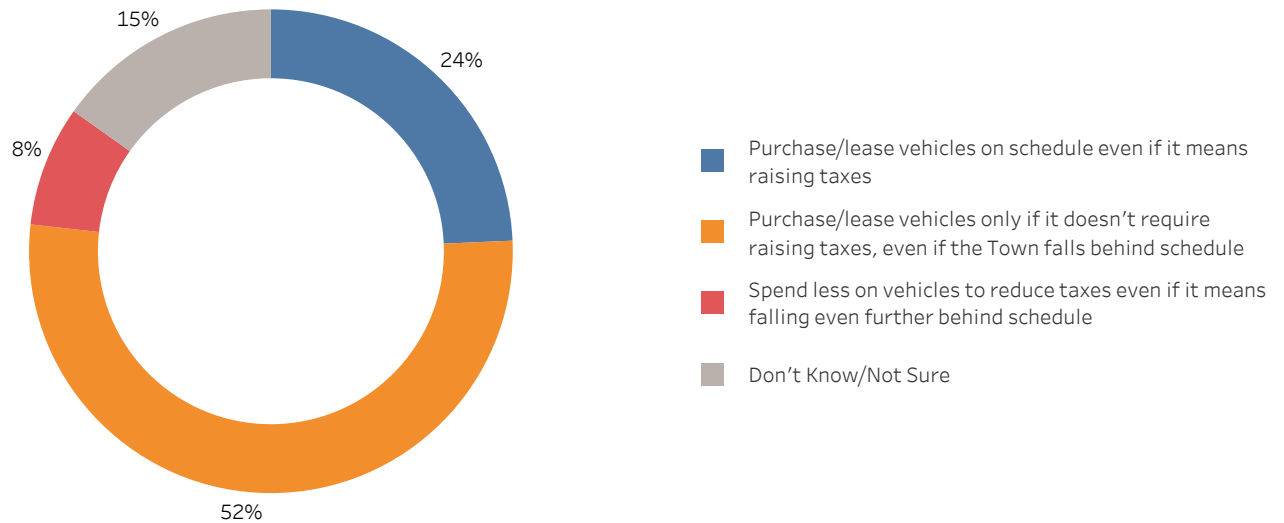
Raymond residents are closely divided on whether the Town generally should buy or lease snowplows and other vehicles. Twenty-eight percent would prefer the Town buy snowplows and other vehicles, 27% would prefer the Town lease them, 18% would prefer neither option, and 27% don't know or are unsure (Figure 11).

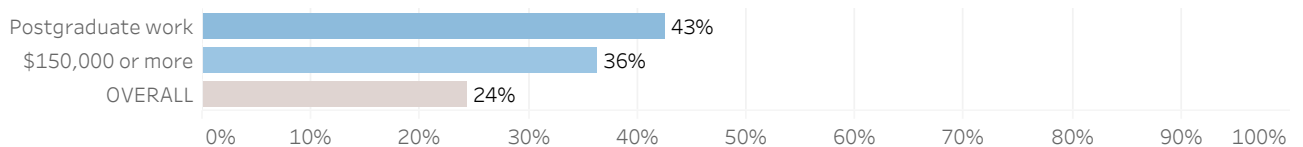
Figure 12a: Which of the following comes closest to your opinion on what the Town should do regarding snowplows and other vehicles?

A quarter of Raymond residents (24%) believe the Town should purchase or lease snowplows and other vehicles on schedule even if it means raising taxes while just over half (52%) say the Town should purchase or lease these vehicles only if it doesn't require raising taxes, even if the Town falls behind schedule. Eight percent of respondents would like the Town to spend less on vehicles to reduce taxes even if it means falling even further behind schedule while 15% don't know or are unsure (Figure 12a).

Figure 12b: Comes Closest to Opinion Regarding Snowplows and Other Vehicles - By Selected Demographics

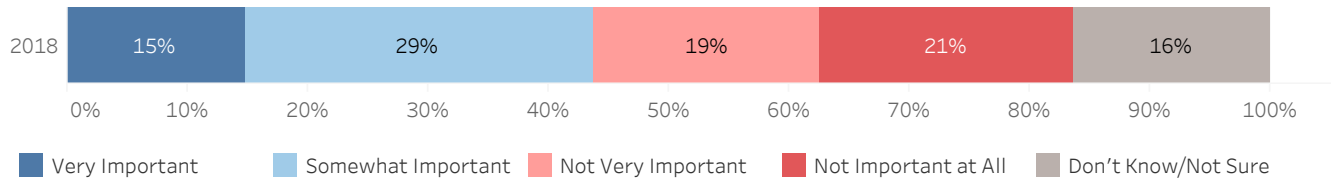

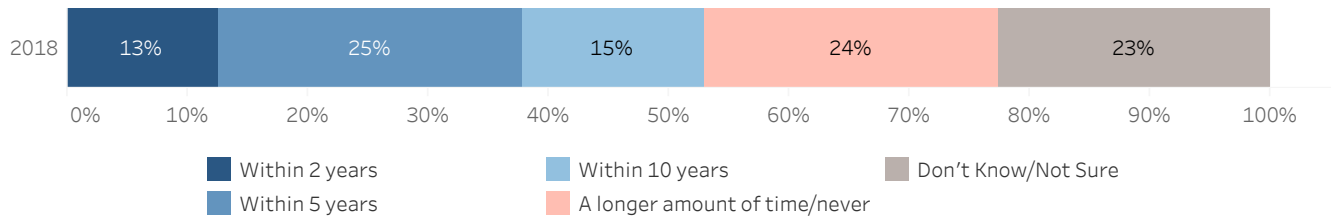
Just under half of Raymond residents (44%) say it is very (15%) or somewhat (29%) important for the Town to install additional wells to increase the town water supply. Nineteen percent say it is not very important for the Town to do so, 21% say it is not important at all, and 16% don't know or are unsure (Figure 13).

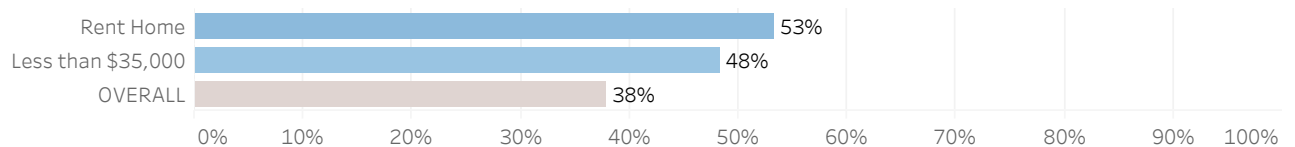
Figure 14a: Within what timeframe do you believe the Town should begin to install additional wells?

Thirteen percent of Raymond residents believe the Town should begin to install additional wells within 2 years, 25% believe work should begin within 5 years, and 15% say it should begin within 10 years. One-quarter (24%) say work should begin in a longer amount of a time or never while 23% don't know or are unsure (Figure 14a).

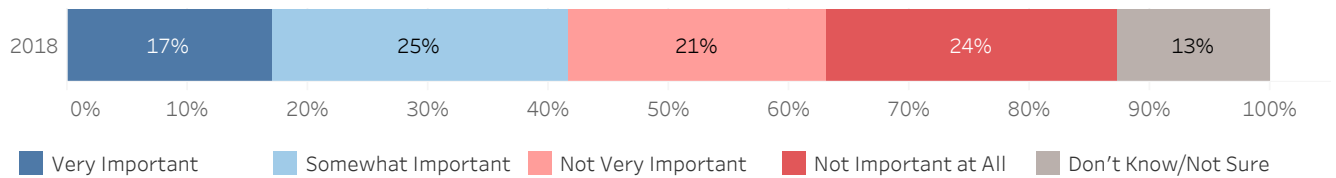
Figure 14b: Timeframe for Town to Install Additional Wells - By Selected Demographics

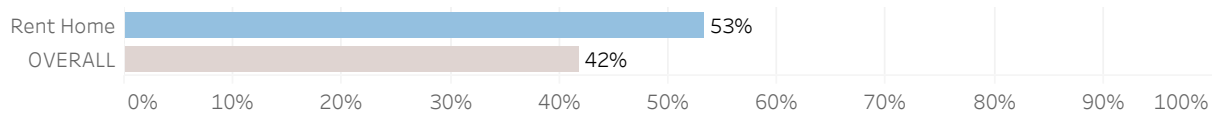
Figure 15a: How important do you think it is for the Town to install sewer facilities?

Forty-two percent of Raymond residents say it is very (17%) or somewhat (25%) important for the Town to install sewer facilities. Twenty-one percent say it is not very important for the Town to do so, 24% say it is not important at all, and 13% don't know or are unsure (Figure 15a).

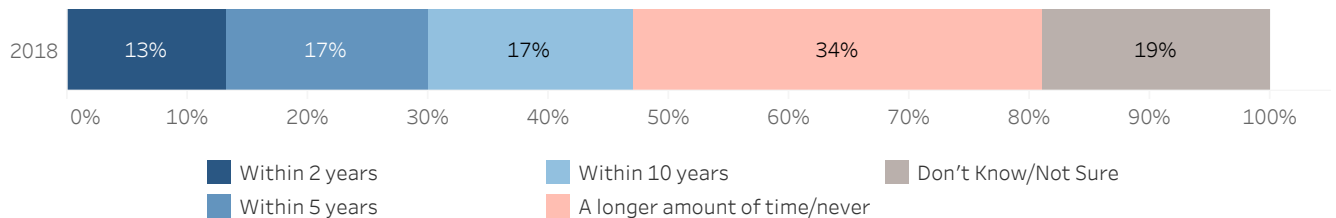
Figure 15b: Importance for Town to Install Sewer Facilities - By Selected Demographics

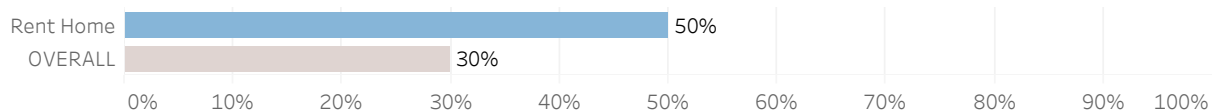
Figure 16a: Within what timeframe do you believe the Town should begin to install sewer facilities?

Thirteen percent of Raymond residents believe the Town should begin to install sewer facilities within 2 years, 17% believe work should begin within 5 years, and 17% say it should begin within 10 years. One-third (34%) say work should begin in a longer amount of a time or never while 19% don't know or are unsure (Figure 16a).

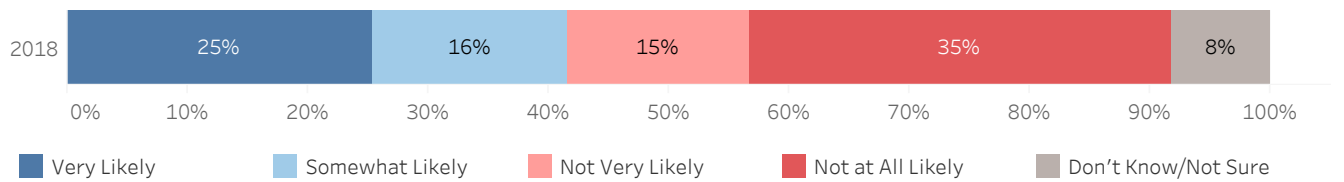
Figure 16b: Timeframe for Town to Install Sewer Facilities - By Selected Demographics

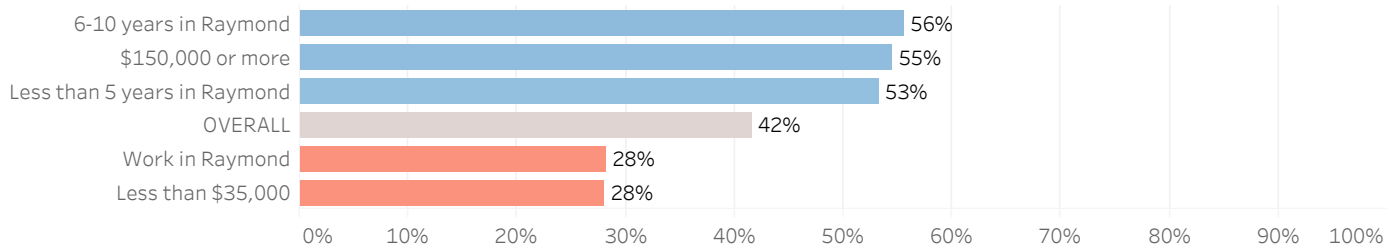
Figure 17a: If natural gas services were made available on your street, how likely would you be to connect to it?

Forty-two percent of Raymond residents say they would be very (25%) or somewhat (16%) likely to connect to natural gas services if it were made available on their street. Fifteen percent say they would be not very likely to connect to natural gas services, 35% say they are not at all likely to do so, and 8% don't know or are unsure (Figure 17a).

- Raymond residents who have lived in Raymond for 10 years or less and those with a household income of \$150,000 or more are more likely than others to say they would be very or somewhat likely to connect to natural gas services if it were made available on their street. Those who work in Raymond and those with a household income below \$35,000 are less likely to say they would connect to natural gas if it were available (Figure 17b).

Figure 17b: Likelihood of Connecting to Natural Gas Services if Available - By Selected Demographics

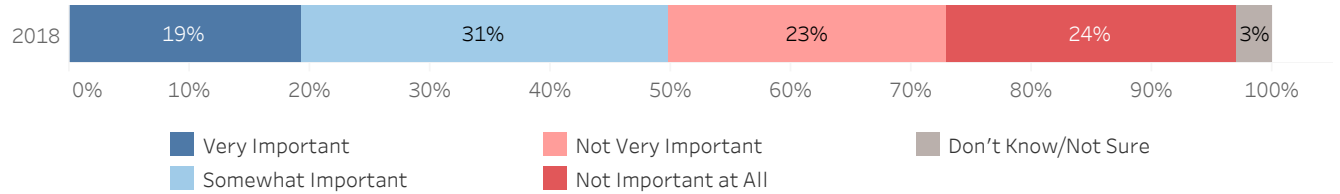

Community Center

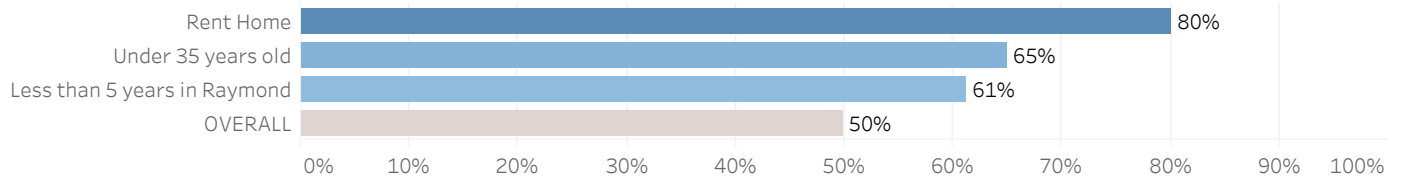
Figure 18a: How important do you think it is for the Town to have a community center to host community events and daily activities?

Half of Raymond residents (50%) think it is very (19%) or somewhat (31%) important for the Town to have a community center to host community events and daily activities. Twenty-three percent say it is not very important for the Town to have a community center, 24% say it is not important at all, and 3% don't know or are unsure (Figure 18a).

Figure 18b: Importance of Town Having Community Center - By Selected Demographics

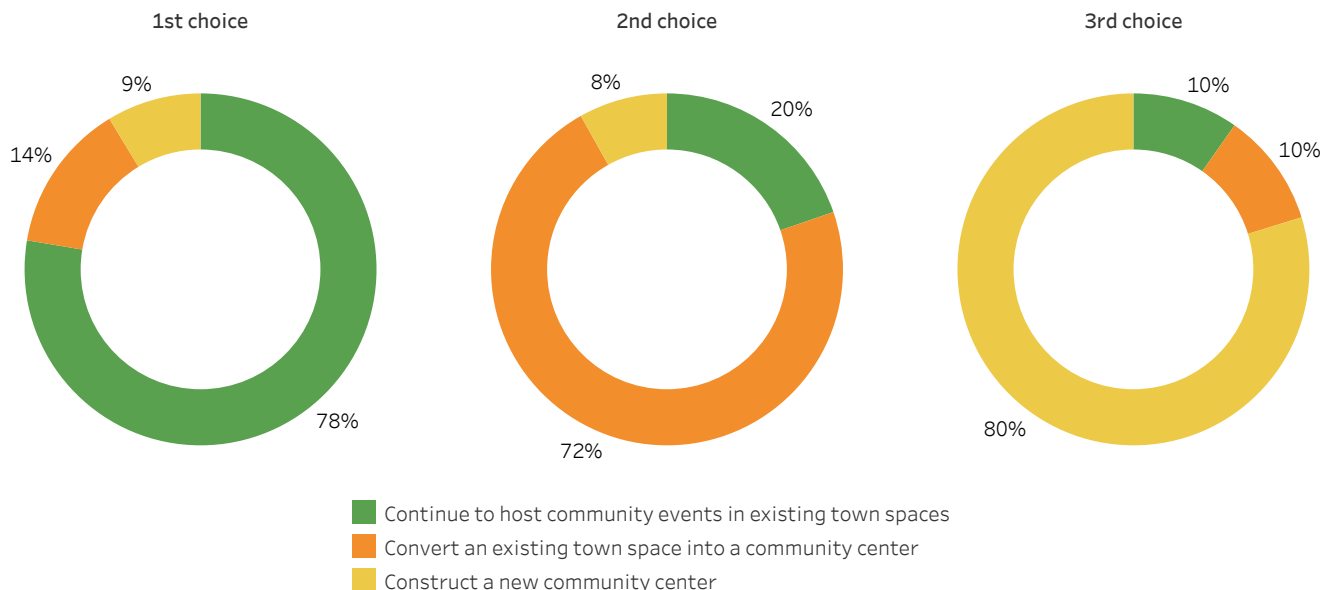

More than three-quarters of Raymond residents (78%) say continuing to host community events in existing town spaces is their first choice among possible plans for a community center in Raymond. Fourteen percent say their first choice is to convert an existing town space into a community center while only 9% say their first choice is to construct a new community center. Seventy-two percent of residents say converting an existing town space into a community center is their second choice among these plans, while 80% say constructing a new community center is their third choice.

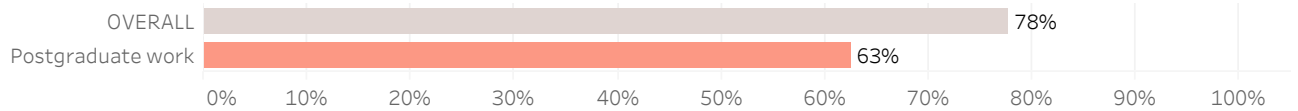
Figure 19a: Please rank the following options for a community center in Raymond

Of the few who suggested a location, the elementary school, the old fire house, the police station, and the old Santander bank site were mentioned most frequently as a space to be converted into a community center (Figure 19a).

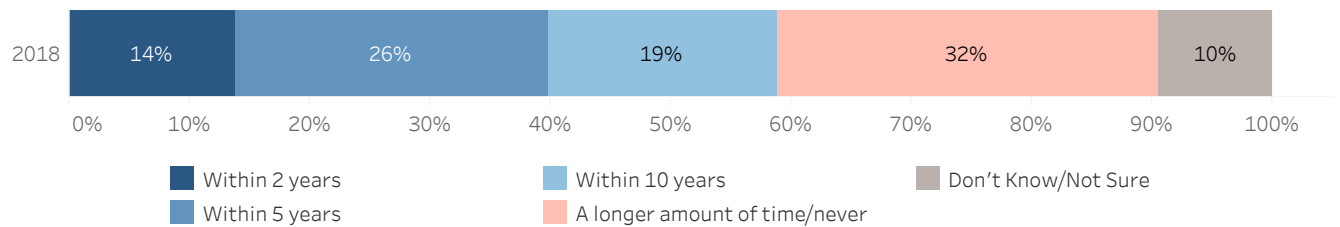
Figure 19b: First Choice Among Plans for Community Center - By Selected Demographics

Fourteen percent of Raymond residents believe the Town should address community center needs within 2 years, a quarter (26%) believe it should be addressed within 5 years, and 19% say it should be addressed within 10 years. Thirty-two percent say community center needs should be addressed in a longer amount of a time or never while 10% don't know or are unsure (Figure 18a).

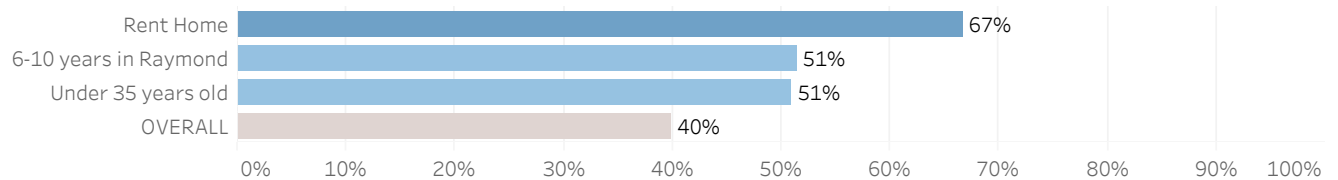
Figure 20a: Within what timeframe do you believe the Town should address community center needs?

Figure 20b: Timeframe for Town to Address Community Center Needs - By Selected Demographics

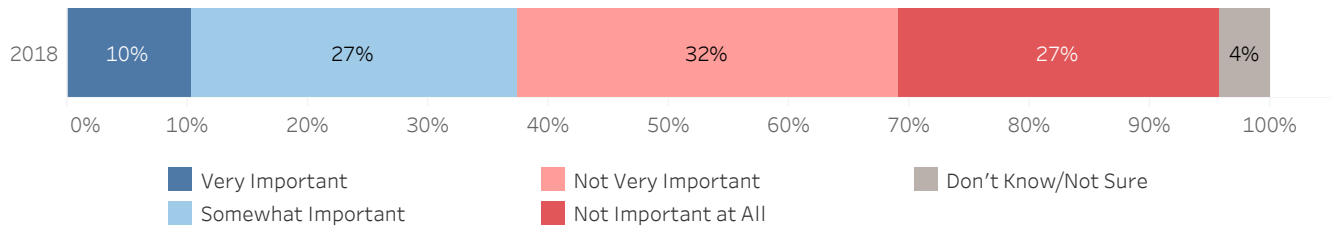

Town Offices

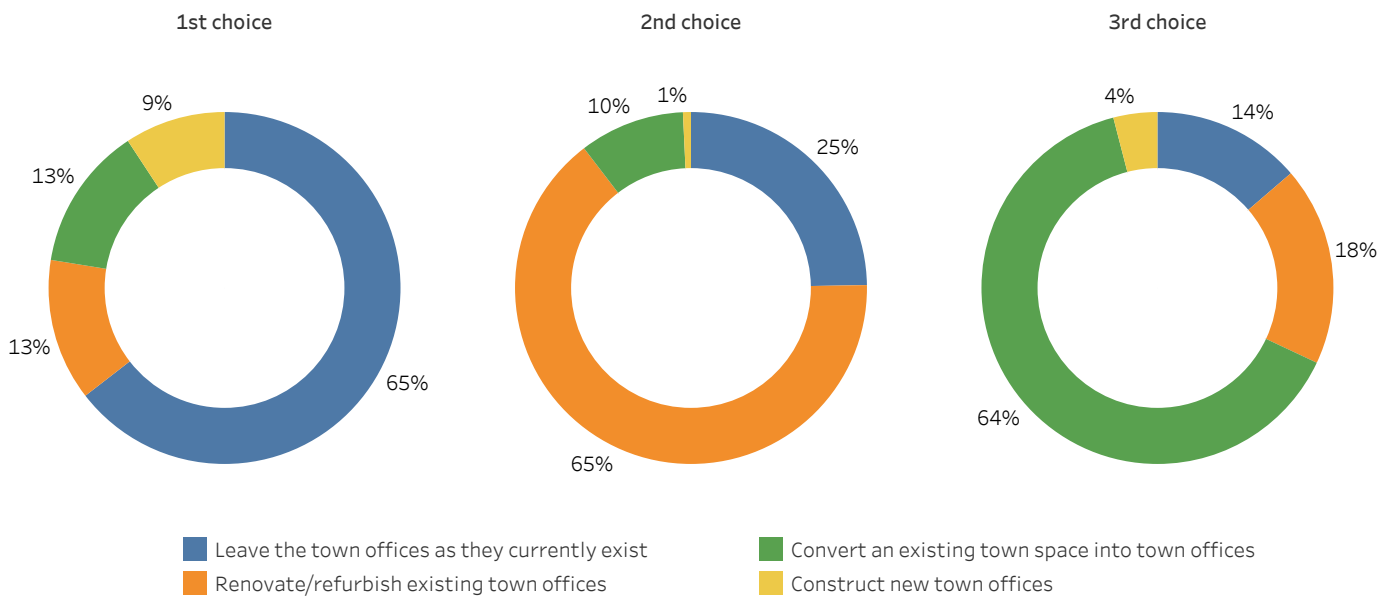
Figure 21: How important do you think it is for the Town to improve the available space for town offices?

Thirty-seven percent of Raymond residents think it is very (10%) or somewhat (27%) important for the Town to improve the available space for town offices. Thirty-two percent say it is not very important for the Town to improve the available space for town offices, 27% say it is not important at all, and 4% don't know or are unsure (Figure 21).

Nearly two-thirds of Raymond residents (65%) say leaving the town offices as they currently exist is their first choice among possible plans for improving the available space for town offices in Raymond. Thirteen percent each say their first choice is to renovate or refurbish existing town offices or to convert an existing town space into town offices, and 9% say their first choice is to construct new town offices. Sixty-five percent of residents say renovating or refurbishing existing town offices is their second choice among these plans, while 64% say converting an existing town space into town offices is their third choice.

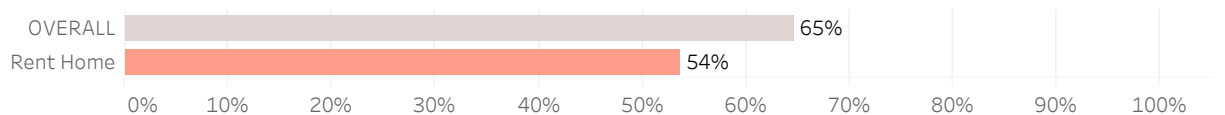
Figure 22a: Please rank the following options for town offices in Raymond

Of the few who suggested a location, the elementary school and the old Santander bank site were mentioned most frequently as a space to be converted into town offices (Figure 22a).

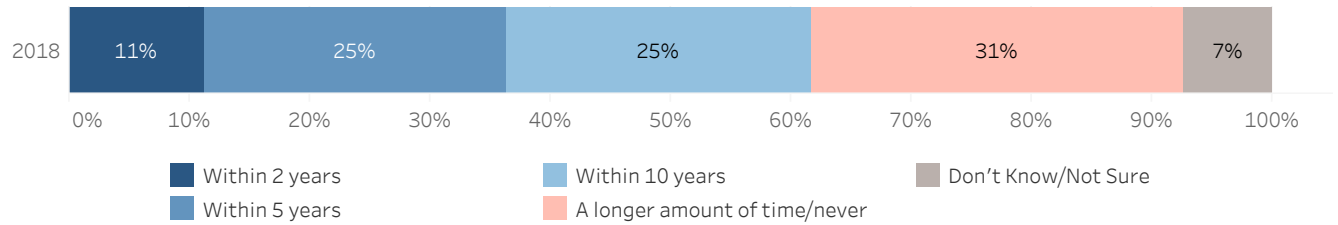
Figure 22b: First Choice Among Plans for Town Offices - By Selected Demographics

Eleven percent of Raymond residents believe the Town should improve the available space for town offices within 2 years, a quarter (25%) believe they should be improved within 5 years, and another quarter (25%) say they should be improved within 10 years. Thirty-one percent say town office space should be improved in a longer amount of a time or never while 7% don't know or are unsure (Figure 23).

On the other hand, some break from the entire burden of educational costs should also be awarded to a population of people who have 'paid their dues' in many ways. Therefore unless there is a commitment from town leaders to change how they perceive this group of people and make modifications in taxing them, I will not be in favor of any tax money being increased for buildings, roads, etc.
- as much as I hate having my taxes go up, I don't want to live in a 2nd or 3rd rate town. Infrastructure and maintenance is as must, Police DP schools town offices etc. this town needs a waste water treatment plant to attract industry. Wells and septic systems are a headache to industry. Look at Epping. Lets remove some of the tax burden, Industry looks at your infrastructure roads, schools etc. nobody wants to throw good money into a bad situation
- attract new businesses to help with town improvements
- Avoid raising property taxes! Run the most efficient town government, including police/fire forces, as possible. Resist the urge to grow the town government unnecessarily. Consider building a new high school or middle school and moving the elementary school into one of those buildings. This is what some other towns do.
- Before the town of Raymond raises our property taxes again, they need to figure out how to increase the commercial tax base to pay for any renovations/additions, new construction to replace facilities or construction of additional buildings. This is an important component missing from your survey.
- Better improving in snow plowing roads in the winter months. Continue with mosquito control. Repair pot holes and do not [Illegible] patch roads because it does not hold up when patching.
- Better road side cleanup. Trash, cut trees, faster sand cleanup in the spring. eliminate paid trash bags. Raymond dump should be free to residents
- Better trash disposal (town trash bags tear)
- Build a new Elementary school off site and give the old one to the town, and move town offices over there. Get rid of those portable classrooms (If there is land enough at the High School, build new Elementary School up there).

giving approval always have outside contractors do the work of a wetland scientist during new developments (not the ones given by the developer) Make sure the town lawyer has the interests of the town and not the developers hold the planning board accountable for not voting in the interest of the town and its residents

- can we get absentee ballots if snowstorm is predicted? I won't drive in snowy conditions please let us know. I've missed voting in March 2 years in a row.
- Careful consideration need to be made as to how our tax dollars are spent. Accurate and detailed accounting is a necessity. Town department heads need to be held accountable to have employees who work in their department show expertise, consistency, personal professional development and pride in their positions. The school and town employees are paid very well with benefits. Certainly not a large group, but there are employees who could/should work for their paychecks.

- Did I miss the page that asked about the fire department? The chief retired last year after almost thirty years of biased leadership, and then you promote the guy (without a fair process) that has been there longer? The fire department is way behind financially and in workforce. When are the internal educated people that understand the fire department is a business, getting promoted? Haven't seen a sign of that yet! Fix the fire department before wasting money on a school we don't need or giving money to our 1.8 million dollar police department.
- didn't vote this year as could not get out because of snow storm
- don't use taxpayer money to put in natural gas lines. Have the supplier pay the cost as well as yearly taxes on infrastructure land use
- during snow storms have employees start plowing immediately instead of waiting until it is overtime pay rate to begin plowing get town employees to repair roads instead of paying outside companies to come in. Allow additional business to come into town other than gas stations and pizza shops, without jumping through so many hoops for approval.

- I bought in this town because I have worked here for 25 years. We loved the hometown feel. I am adamantly against sending my child out to another high school. There may be more opportunities, but with more kids, these opportunities become hard to get. I want my child to be proud to be from Raymond. Shipping our kids out would be a deal breaker for us. Thank you.
- I do not like your round about way to get things passed - Re Question 2, 3, 17, 20. I bet there are a lot of dumb asses that fall for these trick questions, there is no option 2, 3, 4.
- I don't believe this survey will actually serve a purpose because the current selectmen/town manager don't listen to the taxpayers or do what they say. These town leaders will be replaced because of it, (as is already seen from the last elections). I hope the change won't be too extreme.
- I feel as "though" the 2 most important things that are needed in our town for it to be able to function at full capacity is #1 being a new elementary school, and 2# being a newer police station. concerned about people who want to allow industrial, commercial and housing developments to come to Raymond. These acts will lead to a very polluted town. It will NOT lower taxes because it will be putting more strain on our town resources, which will lead to increase of taxes. Please keep Raymond a NICE, SMALL, CLEAN, SAFE community. Don't do anymore development. Think of the health of people in Raymond. Thank you. Also, can someone teach the public works department (Steve Brewer) how to be more responsible with tax dollars? We don't need all these new public works vehicles/trucks. The town should also look into putting all town owned land (That qualifies) into conservation easements in perpetuity.

- I moved to rural Raymond because it's a nice town. I moved away from cities to come here. I don't want development. I don't want residential, commercial, or industrial development. Development will destroy the rural character of Raymond and it will cause pollution. People are living in Raymond because we like it the way it is.
- I should not have to have the school expense in my property taxes for my home. I never went to school in NH nor did I have any child attend school in NH, let the people who have kids in school pay for it. They use it, I didn't, and they always cry for more money.
- I think renting trailers at the elementary school and having them go outside in inclement weather for the bathroom?, gym etc is ridiculous. The cost is also prohibitive. I like everyone else, don't like to see taxes rise, but good schools bring new people, families to town. Therefore my money would go to the schools, not the police. Where I came from in Beverly MA, they are still using the same out dated (80 yr old) station. All 6 schools were motivated first with this in mind. They have peeling paint, wiring hanging etc. They will finally be done using that and satellite offices in late 2021 when the new station will be built.
- I think road potholes and highly degraded roads are in more need than efforts to plow on. No-Harriman Hill is dangerous. Lakeview road is such a mess you can't even safely walk it.
- I think something different needs to be done on the trash. Many bags get torn or the recyclables blow out of the bins and people don't pick it up. This creates a lot of trash on our road ways.
- I will only support a \$6 million addition or less (no gym or new office yet). get rid of 4th grade portables but keep attached 3rd grade ones. for extra space for offices and special ed. Add other stuff later. I attend LRES or farm out elementary to other town. I would like to see our perpetual conservation easements on town owned land. It provides recreation, keeps groundwater clean, and makes town more attractive to residents. Legalize agriculture, camping areas, and churches in all zoning districts. Disallow all adult business establishments (currently allowed by special exception in C.L.) I would like to see open with interpretation panels and picnic tables at town owned freetown gorge (map 23, lot 50) Extend the main street sidewalk to moulton st. on one end and route 27 on the other. - If the Lamprey elementary school sometimes get flooded, what good is it to keep it there or put the police there or even the community center unless it can get fixed so it doesn't flood?
- If the school is in a flood zone then why would it be suitable for a police station? A community center is a nice idea, but I would rank it last on the "I want list." A school is needed but it needs to be thought out thoroughly. Current as well as future needs have to be considered. The police stations need to be a priority due to the difficult situations that must be dealt with daily. Safety takes precedence.
- if the town elects to build a new elementary school the existing facilities should be converted into a police station and the new town offices

Results of the voting was not televised as it usually is, as I looked for the results a number of times. Historically, results have never been ALL in the positive or negative as I recall! Why should we even bother to vote? Is there a system check? There is a great deal of doubt!
- the crux of problems facing Raymond is that developers come in and build houses. They maximize the density of their development. They need to adhere to the rules of the master plan and the planning board needs to deny and stop giving variances to these developers.
- The elementary school can be converted to a police station and community center. That idea may get more support than new police facility.
- The elementary school is very old and was constructed during the 60s open space movement. It is outdated and should be replaced. - The town has too many maintenance crew doing nothing.

- You pay my tax bill! (in regards to questions concerning higher taxes/investing in infrastructure No kids! I should not have to pay school taxes! (in regards to D4)

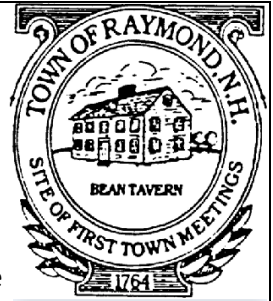

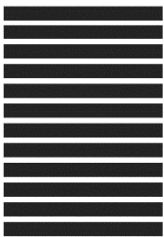
