- 1st grade took a field trip to the NH Audobon; 2nd grade went to Seacoast Science Center.









The former Critical Reading portion of the SAT is now the Evidence-Based Reading and Writing section. This includes the essay portion, which is now optional. The essay is graded with a different scale than the rest of the SAT.
