2019 CIP Committee Goals

Continue intensive scrutiny of needs assessment

Identify how School District can continue current service level with funding capacity

Gradual increase CIP funding to better prepare for large expenditures

Decrease Money In/Money Out practice to prepare for future expenditures

What can CIP do for us?

- A fully functional, healthy CIP has the following benefits for the town
 - Fiscal planning tool for large expenditures
 - Buildings, large equipment, large projects
 - Levels out tax rate and assists in predicting tax impact
 - Items are "saved" for over a number of years
 - Prevents or reduces bonding, and the interest payments required with a bond
 - Prevents sharp spikes in tax rate due to large purchases
 - Allows community to plan for expenditures, showing the impact on the tax rate years in advance
 - Necessary instrument
 - Town of Raymond Master Plan
 - Impact Fees from development

Methodology

Committee defined what items belonged in the CIP

As used in the Capital Improvement Plan, a capital improvement project is defined as a major fiscal expenditure which made infrequently or is non-recurring and includes one or more of the following:

- 1. Acquisition of Land
- 2. Construction or expansion of public facility, street or utility lines
- 3. Non-recurring rehabilitation of a facility
- 4. Design or planning study related to an individual project
- 5. Replacement and purchase of vehicles
- 6. Any item that has a useful life of 5 or more years and costs more than
 - a. Municipality \$20,000
 - b. School District \$10,000
 - c. Food Service \$2,500

Methodology

This Ranking system is adopted and used the Raymond Capital Improvements Committee in developing the School District and Town Capital Improvement Plans.

Class 1 - Urgent - Cannot be delayed; Needed immediately for health and safety.

Class 2 - Necessary - Needed within 3 years to maintain basic level and quality of service.

Class 3 - Desirable - Needed within 4 to 10 years to improve/maintain quality or level of service.

Class 4 - Deferrable - Can be placed on hold until after 10 year period, but supports community development goals.

Class 5 - Premature - Needs more research, planning and coordination.

Class 6 - Inconsistent - Contrary to land use planning or community development goals.

2019 CIP Findings

- Committee Found:
 - CIP is chronically underfunded
 - CIP is currently used as a budget supplement
 - Money in Money out projects
 - No actual savings achieved on a year to year basis
 - Some projects should be part of budget, not CIP
 - Actual funding amount to fully fund CIP far exceeds ability of taxpayers to afford

2019 CIP Proposals

- Consensus of the committee was to recommend that the school district CIP warrant article as proposed with exception of technology purchases
 - •CIP committee split on technology requests
- Committee recommends that the school district retain a portion of their CRF monies each year (reduce money in/money out actions)
- Committee recommends that the school district reexamines items that the CIP committee ranked as inconsistent/premature
 - Items that do not meet definition threshold
 - Items that appear to be routine maintenance (i.e. gym floors, security upgrades)
 - Transition out inconsistent items
