I hope you had a nice Thanksgiving Holiday and had the opportunity to spend some time with family and friends. We now prepare to head into the month of December and the start of winter. Looking back, the last few months have been challenging on so many levels as we continue to deal with a virus that seems to keep us from that return to normal we all hope to obtain soon.

We continue to keep our schools open and deal with this ongoing virus situation with the support we are receiving from our parents and community partners. I appreciate our parents' ability to be adaptive as we continue to work through this return to in-person learning. We will continue to do our best to keep students and staff healthy and schools open.

Over the last few weeks we have expanded our attempts to manage the COVID-19 situation in our schools. The district now offers testing for students and staff on a regular basis. With parent consent we are testing more students and by using the rapid tests we have been able to keep students in school when there is a negative test result. Testing allows us to assess and make the needed adjustments to ensure we better control the overall health of our school buildings. I would encourage parents to provide their consent to allow your child to be part of our testing protocols. For more information contact your child's school nurse.

As a district we have run several vaccine and flu shot clinics with the support of our local Walgreens. This is another attempt to provide students, staff and the community the opportunity to join us in our efforts to keep our schools open for in person instruction. Our most recent attempt to keep schools healthy will include another community partner Lamprey Health.



On December 14, 2021 we will be offering an opportunity for 5-11 year-olds to get vaccinated. Lamprey Health will be providing the team and the vaccines to support this effort.



The second vaccine shot is scheduled for January 4, 2022 and both events will happen after school at IHGMS from 4:00-7:00 p.m. Please check <u>our website</u> for more information on how to take part in this clinic - register by Sunday, December 5th. If you have questions about the vaccine itself I would advise you to react out to your child's pediatrician.

It will take all of us to continue to work together to achieve our goal of keeping school open during these unpredictable times. Your continued support is greatly appreciated and on behalf of the school district I would like to thank you.

We at the middle school are very fortunate to have one of our former students who wanted to come back and work with our students and teachers.





Senior, Bailey Pollock, is participating in a year-long internship with Ms. Bridle's 7th grade Math class. Today, Bailey assisted the students with a lesson regarding circumference and also coordinated and facilitated the monthly STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) activity. The activity involved dry spaghetti, marshmallows and tape. The object for the students was to work in pairs to create the tallest structure, this was a fun, yet challenging task to say the least. This is Bailey's third education focused extended learning activity (ELO). Education is a career path Bailey is considering following high school. #### Workforce to Learn Development Program (TRADES, SKILLS, FUTURE CAREER OPPORTUNITIES)

Looking for a junior or senior student that is interested in taking part in the Workforce to Learn Development Program from January to June, one afternoon a week. This opportunity is for a student who enjoys taking apart and rebuilding appliances and electronics and understands mechanics. The student will be learning about mechanical calibration testing at Jewell Instruments in Manchester NH, all expenses paid for and credit earned, read on.



#### What is the Workforce to Learn Development Program?

The Career Pathways Partnership Grant, established by the NH Charitable Foundation, is a grant that will provide options for students to explore work based experiences. In addition to ELOs, the Workforce Development program will engage students in career exploration opportunities and skill development. The Workforce to Learn Program is a collaboration between Raymond High School and business sectors in and around the Raymond Community.

Students will have the chance to explore a field of interest, learn skills of the trade and experience a real world learning environment, at no cost to the student. The grant funds will provide transportation and or mileage reimbursement, a small work stipend and a scholarship towards trade school, or college pursuit upon successful completion of the program.

To date, the two confirmed businesses we will be working with are **Palmer and Sicard Inc** Construction (Exeter), and Jewell Instruments (Manchester).

#### What are the benefits of the program?

- Gain knowledge of the profession, learn skills, and train for work ready experiences.
- Small stipend, transportation (if needed) and mileage reimbursement provided as well as a post-secondary scholarship to a trade school or college, pending completion of the program.
- Clothing/boots/work supplies will be provided, if needed, at no cost to the student.
- Individualized learning opportunity.
- Students can apply experiences towards ELO credit.
- Resume builder.
- Potential employment with the business, following graduation.


