We faced the challenge of re-entering the year facing staff shortages, outbreaks of COVID in our buildings, jumping between remote instruction for quarantined staff and students, and the social emotional adjustments of returning to in-person instruction for students, staff and parents. It was our ability to adapt and adjust to the many situations this school year threw at us that kept our schools open and students in our seats.

District Student Intervention Team



This year the Raymond School District has reinstituted the District Student Intervention Team (SIT). This team serves as the steering committee for our implementation of multiple tiers of support for students academically, socially and emotionally. This team strives for consistency and vertical alignment PK-12. The work of this team is to ensure that members of the Raymond School District proactively provide our students with age appropriate, multi-tiered levels of support ensuring that strong relationships with our students are built and genuine connections are made. Lastly, this team wants to ensure that data drives our decisions.

Along with increasing consistency across buildings around SIT processes, this team has taken steps to prepare to implement a comprehensive threat assessment model as identified in the current strategic plan. To do so this team has partnered with the National Association for Behavioral Intervention and Threat Assessment (NABITA) for training and consultation. Thus far, this team has attended an all day training to conduct Structured Interviews for Violence Risk Assessment (SIVRA) to strengthen our approach to students at risk of violence to themselves or others. Next, this team and other district leadership will complete a full day training to learn how to bake this into process and procedure into day to day building and district operations.

We look forward to seeing how the efforts of this team support students at a variety of levels both academically, socially and emotionally and promote overall safety in our buildings. Reach High Scholars Summer Enrichment Program

Reach High Roundtables ("Roundtables") is a summer academic enrichment program for rising 8th-10th graders in Raymond and nearby towns. The classes are for curious, motivated students who are interested in fun academic challenges. In 2016, the Reach High Scholars Program took over the direction of Roundtables, which was operated during its first six years by Phillips Exeter Academy ("PEA").

Roundtables will be taught at Iber Holmes Gove Middle School, using Harkness round tables, by teachers from Raymond and PEA. It uses PEA's renowned Harkness Method--a student-centered learning style based on a student's questions and observations. The students learn to take responsibility for their education, to listen to one another, and to explore the potential of their academic and intellectual abilities.

Classes are collaborative and student-led, so learning hinges on each student's commitment and enthusiasm. They meet mornings for 50 minutes, for twelve consecutive weekdays in July. Dates this year are July 7,8, 11-15, 18-22, with a graduation ceremony the evening of July 22nd. Enrollment is intentionally low so that each student receives individual attention and has an opportunity to contribute. There are approximately 12 students in each class and many take more than one course.



This year there will be offerings in Language Arts, Mathematics, and The Teenage Brain (with elements of psychology and neurobiology). The fees for classes will be: one course: \$250; two courses: \$440; three courses: \$600 (a saving of \$150). Greater reductions are available for families receiving financial aid, detailed in the application.

Who makes a good candidate for Roundtables? A student who wants to be there! A student who might enjoy a book club, a student who likes puzzles, a student looking for challenges and opportunities for reaching higher in their academic pursuits.

More than 350 students have participated in Reach High Roundtables.
